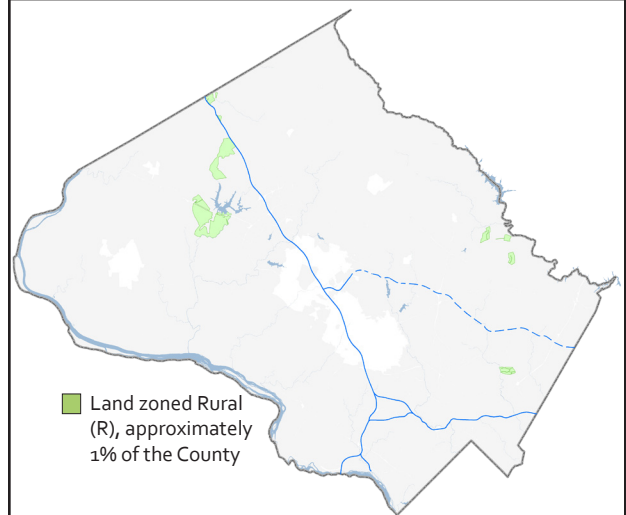


R to RR Zoning Comparison

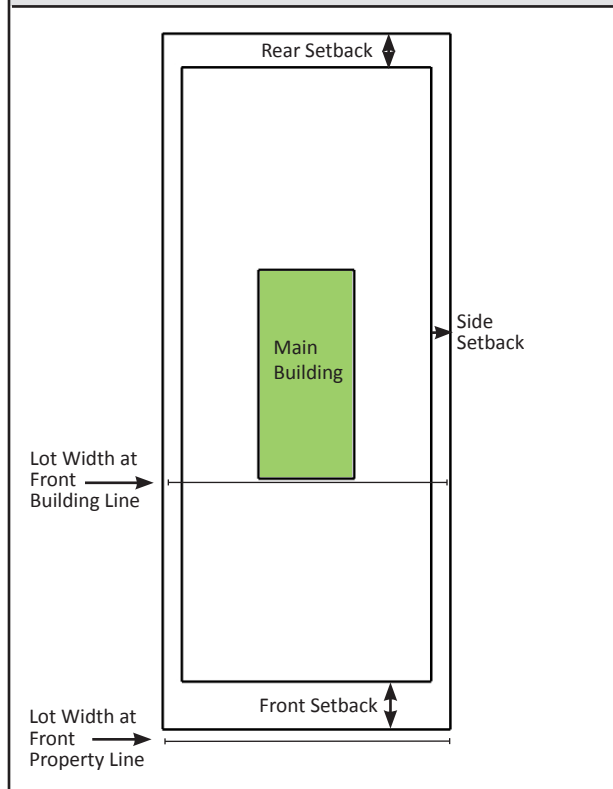
The intent of the Rural Residential (RR) zone is to preserve rural areas of the county for agriculture and other natural resource development, residential uses of a rural character, extensive recreational facilities, and protection of scenic and environmentally sensitive areas.



Existing development in the Rural Zone

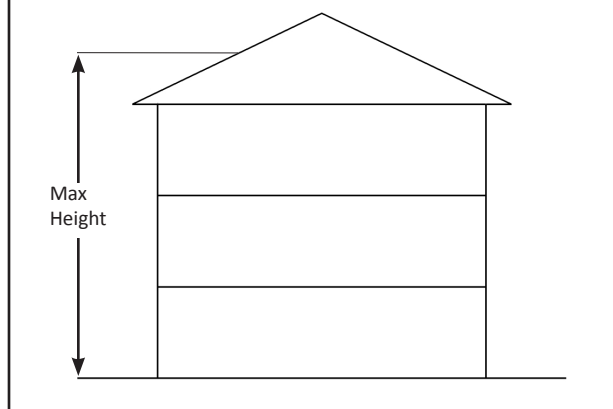


Illustrative Depiction of Standards for Detached House Building Type



Side Section of Structure (Main Building)

Height is proposed to be measured from the average grade to the mean height level between eaves and ridge of a gable, hip, mansard, or gambrel roof or to the highest point of roof surface of a flat roof.
